# 92Y's Musical Introduction Series

# featuring Women in Music

For the second concert in the series the students explored the music of Southeast Asia with Elena Moon Park's Rabbit Days and Dumplings

Born in Tennessee to Korean parents, Elena Moon Park was immersed in the culture and music of her ancestry as a child. It was only when she became an adult that she decided to create unique and original recordings of children's songs from Korea, Tibet, China, and Japan. Through the 92Y Musical Introduction Series, the students learned how she infused certain styles, languages, and instruments from these countries with her own American musical heritage. At the concert, students sang along

with Elena and Friends making rabbit ears for San Toki (Mountain Bunny sing-a-long, Korea), appropriately replying to Anta Gata Doko Sah (Where are you from?, Japan), and jump roping to Sisi Sima (Jump rope song about a peacock, Tibet).

Due to inclement weather, the concerts, originally scheduled for January 22 and 23, were postponed to February 11 and 12. The Center for Educational Outreach worked with over 30 schools to reschedule school and bus reservations in a few short weeks. Because of the strong partnerships of the schools, over 4000 students filled 92Y Kaufmann Concert Hall warming up out of the cold.

During one of the concerts, one of the students and his

mother, who recorded Anta Gata Doko Sah (Where are you from?, Japan) on her CD, joined Elena and Friends onstage to sing for the schools. Another highlight of the concerts was the recognition of two classroom teachers for their strong partnership in the program (see article below). The Musical Introduction Series concerts have once again enriched the students' cultural education through the power of music.

## **Classroom Teachers Awards**


