



92NY's Belfer Center for Innovation & Social Impact Selects 2026 Women inPower Fellows

*92NY announces fellows for its New York City Cohort and expands its groundbreaking
Neurodivergent Leaders Cohort nationwide*

NEW YORK, NY – January 29, 2026 – The 92nd Street Y's (92NY's) [Belfer Center for Innovation & Social Impact](#) today announced their **2026 Class of the Women inPower Fellowship**, a yearlong, cross-sector leadership initiative designed to equip women-identifying professionals with the tools, mentorship, and peer network needed to rise to the highest levels of leadership.

Selected from a highly competitive pool of hundreds of applicants, the 2026 class includes 32 leaders from across the New York City metro area for its NYC Cohort with 25 leaders from across the country for its Neurodivergent Leaders Cohort. The fellows come from diverse sectors including business, nonprofits, government, law, medicine, education, media, technology, philanthropy, the arts, international affairs, and more.

Now in its 11th year, Women inPower's NYC Cohort continues its proven model of executive mentorship, skill-building workshops, and a thriving community of women leaders. This year, Women inPower is also expanding its Neurodivergent Leaders Cohort to welcome fellows from across the nation. A dedicated track within the fellowship, the cohort supports women leaders in navigating systemic barriers, leveraging their strengths, and reimagining traditional leadership models. Launched in 2025, the Neurodivergent Leaders Cohort has already drawn national attention—including recent features in *Forbes* and *Able News*—as a bold new model for empowering neurodivergent professionals.

"For more than 150 years, 92NY has brought people together to strengthen community and civic life," said **Seth Pinsky, CEO of 92NY**. "With the announcement of this year's Women inPower Fellows, we advance that enduring mission by investing in women and leaders who are creating lasting impact and redefining leadership for the next generation.
